An examination of John Loughery's credentials reveals the fact that John is eminently qualified to be considered for admission to the New York State Horseshoe Pitchers Association Hall of Fame as a promoter.

However, John's record also tells another story. It is the story of a good, very competitive horseshoe pitcher who, because of his love for the game and his ability and willingness to organize, became too preoccupied to be able

to continue to concentrate on pitching, too. I recall, for example, many tournaments when John--serving as Tournament Director--took himself out of the tournament so that a late arrival could be accommodated, or to enable a class to avoid byes.

I also recall what a fine competitor and gentleman John was (and still is) during the period when he was a Class A pitcher. A good example that comes to mind was the NYSHPA Class A

Tournament that was held in Lockport in the year of their sesque-centennial celebration. I was pitching well that year, and yet John put together a 75% game which was more than I could handle. In short, during this period, until John allowed promotional work to take up a great deal of his time, John was a very capable pitcher, capable of competing with the best pitchers who were around at that time.

New York State is indeed fortunate that John chose to devote his energy to horseshoe. In my judgment, he is a candidate worthy of your consideration to the NYSHPA Hall of Fame as a Promoter/Pitcher.
